Barricades— In Place For a Reason

The Town of Radville will often use barricades to block off access to streets. Barricades are used mostly for your benefit to prevent accidental entrance into a hazardous area. We use barricades to temporarily restrict access to certain locations during excavations, road construction, paving, etc. They are set in place so that the public does not come into contact with any type of dangerous situation.

This past year, the Town found themselves having to utilize barricades quite often. But we also found that they are being ignored. We have had vehicles drive around barricades while streets were being excavated as well as vehicles ignoring barricades during paving.

We would like to remind the community to be mindful of barricades. When a vehicle goes through a barricade it puts the vehicle, as well as the contractors, in danger and it also slows down construction. There is always an alternate route.

Please watch for barricades, for your safety and ours!!

Please remember common courtesy when registering concerns with the Town of Radville. The Town policy is intended to set out the generally accepted procedures for residents when reporting concerns or filing complaints with Council or Staff. All concerns/complaints must be clearly identified in writing and must fall within the ability of the Town of Radville to deal with under the current Provincial Legislation. Any action requested or taken must be clear and transparent by the complainant. Anonymous concerns/complaints will not be given considerations.



Landlords Be Aware

Section 369 of *The Municipalities Act*, provides the authority to add outstanding utility accounts to the tax roll whether it was supplied to the owner or renter of the property. If the amounts are added to the tax roll of a parcel of land the amount is deemed for all purposes to be tax imposed from the date it was added to the roll and forms a lien against the parcel of land in favor of the municipality from the date it was added to the tax roll.

Once the outstanding amount has been transferred to the property taxes, it is due and payable by the property owner.

As the property owner, you have the option to have the account for your rental property in your name and subsequently, charge your tenant through your rental rates.
