Saving Water Will Save You Money

Even the smallest leak has the potential of causing a large utility bill. The majority of leaks occur in the bathroom and the most common culprit is the toilet. Residents can see if their toilet is leaking by:

- Putting a few drops of food coloring in the toilet tank, wait 15 minutes and then check to see if the water in the toilet bowl changed color.

- If the water has changed color, the toilet is leaking.

Dripping faucets are another common source of water leaks. Ensuring the taps are tight can often prevent this.

F.O.G. - Fats, Oils & Grease

When FOG is dumped down the drain, it forms large, thick grease balls that clog pipes. Paper towels, tissues and wipes combined with FOG are a destructive combination.

When FOG forms grease balls that stick to the pipes and paper products that take too long to decompose are flushed, it causes horrible blockages in the sewer pipes.

Do not pour fat, oil or grease down drains or garbage disposals.

Don't use hot water to rinse grease off cookware, utensils, dishes or surfaces.

Don't flush paper towels, tissues or flushable wipes.

Benefits of Reading Your Water Meter

Regular reading of your water meter allows you to keep your account current and accurate.

Your water bill is then based on your actual consumption instead of an estimate that could result in an inaccurate billing.

If you have had a number of estimated reads, followed by an actual read - you may see a sudden rise in your water bill amount if your water consumption was higher than what was estimated.

When you do consistent, actual reads you can monitor your actual water usage.

Landlords Be Aware

Section 369 of *The Municipalities Act*, provides the authority to add outstanding utility accounts to the tax roll whether it was supplied to the owner or renter of the property. If the amounts are added to the tax roll of a parcel of land the amount is deemed for all purposes to be tax imposed from the date it was added to the roll and forms a lien against the parcel of land in favour of the municipality from the date it was added to the tax roll.

Once the outstanding amount has been transferred to the property taxes, it is due and payable by the property owner.

As the property owner, you have the option to have the account for your rental property in your name and subsequently, charge your tenant through your rental rates.
